

## *Ann Krueger Bonen, 93*

Ann Krueger Bonen, 93, Aberdeen, died at St. Luke's Midland Regional Medical Center Thursday, Dec. 12.

The funeral was held Monday, Dec. 16, at the Westside Wesleyan Church, Bristol, with the Rev. Tim Purcell officiating. Burial followed at Sunset Memorial Gardens, Aberdeen, under the direction of Miller-Huebl Funeral Home.

Ann Fadness was born December 5, 1898 in Oak Gulch Township, Day County, rural Butler, South Dakota, to Ole and Inga (Snipstead) Fadness. This is the area where she grew up and attended school. She attended college at Madison, Minn.; Madison, S.D.; and later attended Northern Normal where she received her teaching degree. She taught school for 13 years in Day County. She also taught at the State Training School at Plankinton and at Ferney. She married Fred O. Krueger at Webster on September 22, 1926. They made their home on a farm near Ferney. Mr. Krueger died April 12, 1968 at Aberdeen. She married Henry Bonen at Aberdeen on September 27, 1973. Mr. Bonen died on July 23, 1976 at Aberdeen. She continued to make Aberdeen her home.

She was a member of the Westside Wesleyan Church, Bristol. She taught Sunday School for many years and as a young woman she taught Bible School in the Norwegian language.

Survivors include two sons, Lyle Krueger, Conde; Leon Krueger, Sioux Falls; two step sons, Donald H. Bonen, and Charles "Jim" Bonen, both of Aberdeen; one daughter, Mrs. Merlin (YeVonne) Siefken, Aberdeen; one brother, Lawrence Fadness, Webster; ten grandchildren; 8 step grandchildren; 9 great grandchildren and 12 step great grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her parents, first and second husbands, two grandchildren; two sisters, two brothers, one step grandson and one step great grandson.
