

# Clarence Grieben

Clarence E. Grieben, <sup>9-11-35</sup>75, of 1215 S. 1st St., died Wednesday, Sept. 4, 1985, at his home.

The funeral was held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 7, at Miller-Huebl Funeral Home, 1111 S. Main St., with the Rev. Cynthia Ganzkow-Wold of Bethlehem Lutheran Church officiating.

Burial was in Riverside Memorial Park with military graveside rites by the Sidney L. Smith American Legion Post No. 24 of Aberdeen.

Casketbearers were all nephews; Randall Crawford, Everett Maynard, Duane Mullner, Louis Cramp-ton, William Campton and Ralph Grieben. Organist was Arliss Alberts with a solo by Sharon Maynard.

Clarence Grieben was born March 1, 1910, near Ferney, to John and Emma Linse Grieben. He started school at Randolph and moved to Lincoln Township when he was nine. He completed his education there and did farm work in the area before entering the U.S. Army April 10, 1942, during World War II. He married Gladys E. Maynard June 14, 1944, at Aberdeen and was honorably discharged October 7, 1946. He returned to Aberdeen where he worked as a freight handler for the Milwaukee Road for 25 years before ill health forced his retirement.

He was a member of Bethlehem Lutheran Church and Union 1000 of the railroad.

Survivors include his wife, Aberdeen; one son, B. (Jerry) Johnson, Wichita, Kan.; his mother, Aberdeen Nursing Center; two brothers, Henry, Aberdeen, and Donald, Tumwater, Wash.; four sisters, Mrs. Albert (Frances) Wellman, Bristol; Mrs. Houser (Gertrude) Mullner, Aberdeen; Mrs. William (Verona) Prouse, Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. Orville (Oriett) Crawford, Frederick; three grandchildren; four great-grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.
