### Mrs. E. G. Link Dies at Chicago Saturday

Mrs. E. G. Link, formerly Miss Frances Reynolds of Groton, died at her home in Chicago last Saturday and the body was brought here for the final funeral obsequies, which were held on Tuesday of this week at the home of her mother, Mrs. Reynolds, conducted by Rev. E. W. Spence.

The death of Mrs. Link was extremely pathetic in its circumstances. For the past three and a half years she has been in very poor health, but made a gallant fight to prolong life, at one time having one of her limbs removed to forestall the inevitable. Some three weeks ago her affliction became extremely aggravated and was forced to go to a hospital for treatment. Although every care was given her she was not able to resist the overpowering malady which finally claimed her life.

Mrs. Link was a Groton girl. She was born in this city, June 5, 1900, and was 31 years of age at the time of her death. She graduated from the local school with high honors and later attended Dakota Wesleyan University at Mitchell, equipping herself as an instructor. Following her graduation there, she came back to her home at Groton and became a member of the school faculty here, which position she held for a number of years. She was married to Mr. Link in June, 1927, and shortly thereafter left for Chicago, where she has since made her home.

She is survived by a 5½ months old daughter and a sister, Mrs. L. D. Nichols, of Watertown, her husband and mother. A sister, Louise, expired about five years ago and her father four years later. Mrs. Nichols has been at the bedside of her sister for the past three weeks, or since her condition became critical.

Those attending the funeral from out of town were Theodore Link, a twin brother of the husband from Sioux City; Dr. and Mrs. Sheldon Adams, of Yankton; Dr. John Adams and wife of Aberdeen, and L. D. Nichols of Watertown, besides a host of friends of the family.
