

DEATH BY ACCIDENT.

Sept. 8, — 1898

Charley Linse, residing eight miles south of here, met death in a most frightful manner Thursday evening. He was driving five horses attached to a gang plow, and the supposition is that while hooking up a tug the team suddenly started, catching him beneath the plow. He was horribly cut and bruised, both legs receiving long deep gashes from the shares, cutting the main artery in the right and breaking the left. The left arm was broken and badly cut, and there was also a deep gash in his head and between the shoulders. At about eight o'clock his eleven year-old son noticed the horses tangled up in a wire fence, and failing to find his father, he ran to J. W. Herold's house for assistance. Mr. Herold was not at home, but his son, of twelve years, went back with the lad to investigate, and after a little search they found the body, not far from where he had been plowing. Mrs. Linse was in Groton during the afternoon and returned home just after the body had been discovered.

Mr. Linse and family came to Dakota in the fall of '82, and filed on the three quarters which they now own. He was forty-six years of age and leaves a wife and seven children in comfortable circumstances. The funeral was held at their residence Saturday afternoon and the remains were buried in the Ferney cemetery.
