MRS. ED. MOORE PASSES AWAY
FRIDAY MORNING FROM
HEART TROUBLE

Mrs. Ed. Moore, a highly respected and venerable lady of this city, passed away Friday morning from heart failure.

Mrs. Moore had not been in the best of health for the past year or so. She sought medical advice and treatment at Rochester, Minn., and other hospitals in a vain endeavor to restore her health, but without success. Last week she underwent a slight operation, and for the time being appeared to be recovering to a certain extent, and the news that she had passed quietly and peacefully away came as a great shock to the immediate family and her numerous friends over the city.

Mrs. Moore was born at Belmont, Ont., Canada, on April 16, 1855, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas McGregor. She was married to Mr. Moore at St. Thomas, Ont., Canada, in March, 1878. In 1883 Mr. and Mrs. Moore came to this section and settled on a homestead five miles southwest of Groton. Together they braved the hardships of early pioneer days on the Dakota plains, enjoying alike times of adversity and eras of prosperity. Her buoyant spirit and steadfast faith in this great land remained with her until the last and she slipped off into the Last Great Sleep attended by a serenity and calmness which comes only to those whose faith has been upheld by Time's onward march, and the knowledge that a long life of useful years had been dedicated with constant devotion to family and friends alike.

Mrs. Moore was the mother of two children. One of these, Hazel, died about 25 years ago at the age of ten. The other, Mrs. Daisy Burdick, was at her bedside at the time of her mother's death. Other relatives left to mourn her loss are her husband, and one brother and one sister, H. C. McGregor, of Belmont, Ont., and Mrs. A. J. Charlton, of Lowden, Iowa, and a niece, Mrs. George Saunders, of Strat-
