

# EMMA" STREETER, D PIONEER, IS DEAD

Community lost one of its oldest  
and pioneer residents on Fri-  
day week when Mrs. Lucy Jane  
nearly 86 years of age,  
died at the Streeter home after  
of two weeks.

Emma" Streeter, as she was so  
known by everyone, was born in  
Cattaraugus county, New York, on De-  
cember 10, 1835, and at the age of  
moved to Michigan where her  
husband died. At the age of seven-  
she moved with her sisters to  
Groton and a year later married  
H. Streeter. They came to  
Groton in May, 1882, settling on a  
farm north of town. Mr. Street-  
er died in 1909.

Two weeks ago when Mrs. Streeter's  
youngest daughter removed to the W. S.  
residence for the winter  
the aged woman became frail  
and remained in bed. She grad-  
ually lost strength on account of her  
old age, and the end came on  
the evening, Oct. 28, at 8 o'clock.

Her children were with her before  
she died. Wesley S. and Carrie  
both residents of Groton, Mrs.  
Mary Ward, came from Gilman, Wis.,  
and Robert C. Streeter of Kansas City  
were here for several days, but was  
unable to return home last Thursday.

Funeral services were held on Sun-  
day morning at the Presbyterian  
church. Rev. A. R. Hickman officiat-  
ed. In spite of the weather and bad  
luck and the fact that no extensive  
crowd had gone out of the funeral, the  
services were largely attended, show-  
ing a host of friends the deceased  
belonged to the community. Interment was  
made in the Groton cemetery.
