RANDOLPH PIONEER ENTERS LONG REST

**JOHN MATTHEW GRINOLDS DIES
MONDAY FOLLOWING SHORT
LAST ILLNESS**

Death came for John M. Grinolds, pioneer resident of the Randolph community, Monday afternoon at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. O. Bahr, at the age of 74 years. He had been in vacillating health for several years, but the fatal malady was only of about a week's duration.

Active during his days of health and strength, he took great pleasure only about two weeks before his death in going out into the field to help shock grain.

Born near Mauston, Wis. on September 15, 1867, he came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Grinolds to the Randolph vicinity in 1881 and this community has since that time been his home, except for a brief period when he was employed by the Milwaukee railroad in Aberdeen.

He was married to Miss Louella May Temple at Mauston, Wis., on January 26, 1903, and to the union three daughters were born all of whom survive, together with his wife. The daughters are: Mrs. V. Mount Rose, Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Wm. Howell, Minneapolis, and Mrs. H. O. Bahr, Ferney. Other survivors include a brother, Matthew Grinolds, Clinton, Iowa, and two sisters, Mrs. Altha Schulz, Mauston, Wis., and Miss Maude Grinolds, Chicago.

Funeral services will be held at the Paetznick Funeral Chapel here on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with the Rev. L. C. Benson, pastor of the local Methodist church officiating, and interment will be in the Groton union cemetery.

Mr. Grinolds was active in community activities and for several years conducting a store at Ferney, retiring from that enterprise about 15 years ago. He was a member of the Odd Fellows, Modern Woodmen and the Methodist church of Mauston, Wis.
