Former Groton Man Dies; Funeral Held on Friday

Funeral services were held Friday, Nov. 3, at the Paetznick Funeral Home for Adolph G. Schott, who was at one time a leading citizen in the Groton community, coming here from Minnesota in the year of 1882, settling on a farm near Groton. He was a pioneer settler buying the rights to his land from an early homesteader. He himself, homesteaded in North Dakota, and thus, became a land owner in two states.

Adolph G. Scott was born in Winona, Minn., December 6, 1863, at a time when Minnesota was also new, and while modern conveniences were not yet known.

In Groton vicinity he met Adelia Reamann home he married Dec. 20, 1892, from which union three children were born all of whom survive: Roy H., of Groton; John W., of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Jenabel Kaster of Hazelton, N. D. At the time of his death, he had also five grandchildren. His wife passed away in 1931.

On October 29, 1944, he passed away in Bismarck, N. D., after being in failing health for several years. The immediate cause of death was diabetes.

The Rev. H. W. Atkinson conducted his last rites Friday afternoon, Nov. 3. Interment was made in the Groton Union Cemetary.

Thus another worthy pioneer settler and highly respected citizen was removed from our midst. He did his work well and leaves behind him a memory of a life well spent. The Independent expresses sympathy to those who mourn his loss.
